As you have likely heard, we recently celebrated the 5th anniversary of CHPV with a bountiful reception in the grand lobby of the Hyde Park Bank. It was a lovely event, thanks to impeccable planning and execution by the committee, especially chair Terry Stumpf. See Terry's detailed summary of the evening on page 9!

CHPV has been in partnership with the Community Programs Accelerator (CPA) since the founding days. The CPA continues to be a

tremendous support for the Village as a tool to grow organizational capacity. I have had an extra busy fall due to some great professional development opportunities related to our CPA partnership that promise to deepen my executive director skills and therefore benefit the whole organization as we move ahead together.

You may have seen my email last Tuesday about the Civic Actor Studio (CAS). This was a unique 4-day intensive retreat developed by Joanie Friedman at the Office of Civic Engagement and led by Charles Newell of the Court Theatre and Harry Davis from Booth. Just being in the same room with such accomplished, thoughtful, creative leaders was a gift - watching them work to guide this inaugural group of 22 "civic actors" was transformative! Opportunities for creative partnership and spreading the word about CHPV were abundant.

The Monday following CAS I started the Certificate in Non-Profit Management Program (CNPM), which is the fruit of a partnership between the Community Programs Accelerator and the School of Social Service (SSA). This is a cohort of 25 non-profit leaders representing 25 different organizations on the South Side. This fall we have participated in a course titled "The Evolving Nonprofit Sector," taught by SSA professor Jennifer Mosley. During the winter and spring quarters we will participate in applied workshops on topics essential to non-profit operations.

Needless to say, it has been a busy fall full of learning! I look forward to bringing my learning to the leadership of CHPV in 2020.

CHPV PARTNERSHIPS

Since its very beginnings, the Chicago Hyde Park Village has expanded its reach and stretched its resources through partnerships. Collaboration with a host or liked minded organization such as the <u>Coalition for a Modern Metric Electric</u> not only adds our voice to this important cause but also helps keep authorities aware of older residents' transportation needs. CHPV's partnership with the local <u>Gilbert and Sullivan Opera Company</u> not only supports a major community cultural organization but also makes discount tickets available to our members. <u>Artful Aging activities at the Hyde Park Art Center introduces neighbors to its many resources and programs and provides welcoming space for CHPV's activities.</u>

CHPV's major institutional partners are <u>The University of Chicago Office of</u> <u>Civic Engagement</u> and UC Medicine's <u>SHARE Network</u> based in the Section of Geriatrics and Palliative Medicine. As Michelle mentions in her report, she as well as CHPV benefit greatly as U of C Community Accelerator Associates. As SHARE partners, we work with and learn about other programs and activities throughout the South Side.

Beyond our community we share information and resources with the other Villages in the Chicago area and with the <u>Chicago Aging Collaborative</u>, which promotes an intergenerational "Livable Chicago for All Ages." On the national level, CHPV works with the <u>Village to Village Network</u> which held its annual meeting in Chicago last September.

In 2020, CHPV plans to expand adding more structure to the **Partnership Committee**. Consider joining the Committee's effort if you are interested in promoting intergenerational activities that support an age friendly community. All ideas, potential members and partners welcome.

NEW MEMBER SERVICES: Telephone Check-ins

The Member Services Committee has been working diligently to implement new services for members. We will be ready to begin offering telephone checkins in the New Year. What is a telephone check-in? One of the biggest worries for seniors living alone is that something might happen to them and no one will notice. A telephone check-in is a call from a trained CHPV volunteer to a CHPV member at an agreed upon time of day on a scheduled basis. CHPV members will provide emergency contact information that volunteers can contact should they be unsuccessful in connecting with the senior at the agreed upon schedule. The telephone check-ins will help seniors to feel confident about remaining independent in their homes by giving them and their family members the security of knowing that someone is checking in with them regularly. IN MEMORIUM Dorothy Clark Baker: March 27, 1942 - September 18, 2019



Dorothy Clark Baker, a resident of Chicago, Illinois, died September 18 while on a trip to Hilton Head, South Carolina. Born March 27, 1942, in Baxley, Georgia, of parents Sara Jane Googe and Robert Cecil Clark, Sr., she graduated from Baker High School in Columbus, Georgia in 1960. She completed training as a Registered Nurse at Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta and then received a Bachelor of Arts in Nursing from the

University of Georgia. She was employed at Eggleston Children's Hospital where she held several supervisory positions and developed a special interest in managing children with ruminator syndrome. In 1971 she entered the Graduate Nursing program at the University of Pittsburgh, where she received a Master's degree in nursing. In 1979 she took a job as Vice President in Nursing at Newington Children's Hospital in Newington, Connecticut, where she remained for 10 years. She then married Dr. Alfred L. Baker of Chicago, Illinois, and the couple resided in Chicago until Ms. Baker's death. She worked with 'Friends Against Aids' at the University of Chicago and held several positions at the Church of St. Paul and the Redeemer. She was active in city ward politics, and along with her husband, was a strong supporter of Wake Forest University. She is survived by her husband, Dr. Baker an emeritus Professor of Medicine at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine; one sister, Ann Clark Morrison of Hilton Head; several nieces and nephews, including Deborah Morrison McCandless of Hilton Head; Patricia Morrison Mack of Columbia, South Carolina; Gregory Blen Clark of Woodstock, Georgia; Michael Brian Clark of Virginia; and numerous grand-nieces, grand-nephews, and cousins.

A memorial service was held at 3:00 p. m. on November 2 at the Church of St. Paul and the Redeemer, 4945 South Dorchester Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. Allison Hartman: November 13, 1931 – November 13, 2019



Allison Hartman, JD died on November 13, 2019 at 88. Allison was on the organizing committee for the Chicago Hyde Park Village, and was serving on the Board when she died. She was also President of DARE (Disabled Adult Residential Enterprise), and on the Board of the Hyde Park Kenwood Community Conference. As one of the founding Commissioners of SSA 61 (Hyde Park Commission), Allison focused her attention on the needs of the small business owners who are service providers in the neighborhood and whose

needs are typically overlooked in favor of the needs of retail businesses.

Allison had several careers. She was a stay-at-home mom with her two sons JR and Dan, then the owner of Hyde Park Auto Service and a racing mechanic. When her parents needed more help, she moved closer to care for them; after they died, she moved into the family home and remained living there. Allison bought several abandoned buildings and with her son JR brought them back as viable housing. She also returned to school to finish her BA, and ended up with a JD plus a Masters in Real Estate law. She was also a moving force in women's self defense. With her background in Judo (black belt), she was a key member of Chimera, later Power for Women, which offered classes in Hyde Park and elsewhere in the Chicago area in past decades. She was a longtime member of an Illinois gun club, competing in national benchrest rifle target shooting and hosting weekend events at the gun range to introduce women to target shooting and to increase their comfort level around firearms.

Allison was preceded in death by her son JR earlier this year. She is survived by her son Dan (the artist who designed the CHPV logo), and her husband John Millington. Memorial service plans are pending. *[By Jay Mulberry, Merry Bolt, Mary Rogel, Margaret Huyck]*

Rae L. "Betsie" Zerlin: March 23, 1934 – August 15, 2019

Betsie Zerlin was on the organizing committee for the Chicago Hyde Park Village. Her life was celebrated in a memorial service on October 12 at Montgomery Place. She lived much of her adult life in Hyde Park, where she and her husband Stanley raised their two children, Sharon and David. She became an assistant teacher at the Lab School, which led to a long career working with children. After attaining degrees from Roosevelt and Loyola Universities, Betsie was a teacher at Ancona Montessori school in Hyde Park, then a child therapist and social worker

for Catholic Charities and the Chicago Public Schools. She also maintained a private clinical practice.

Always creative in large and small ways, Betsie was accomplished at, and took pleasure in, gardening, cooking for her family and others, painting, drawing, printmaking, photography, and digital image-making. She delighted in entertaining, for years hosting annual solstice parties which were notable for their mix of generations, cheerfully clothed guests, and warm atmosphere. She was involved with OWL (the Older Women's League) and the Association for Retired Social Workers.

After her husband's death in 2012, Betsie moved into Montgomery Place, where she enjoyed the speakers, the short story club, movie night, art classes, and conversations. She loved both her friends and the staff. *[notes from her Memorial Service program]*
